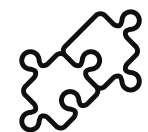

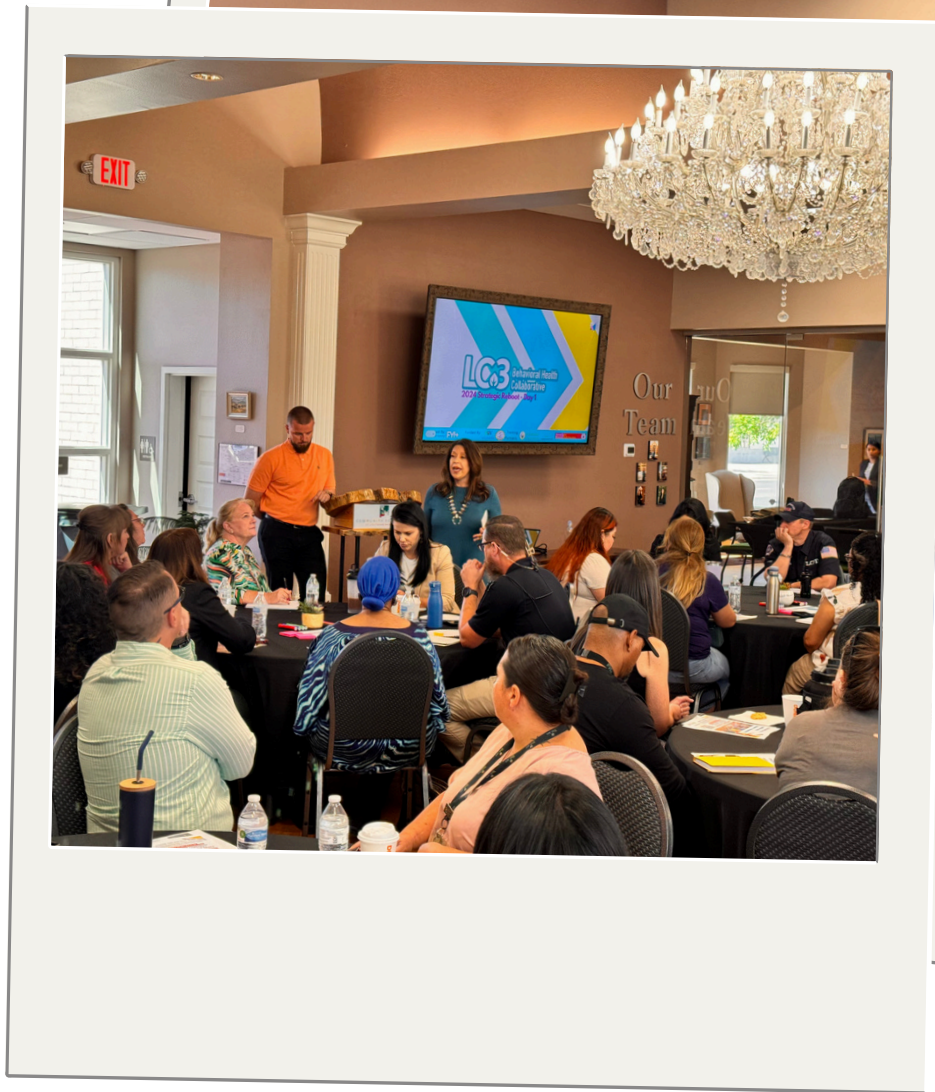

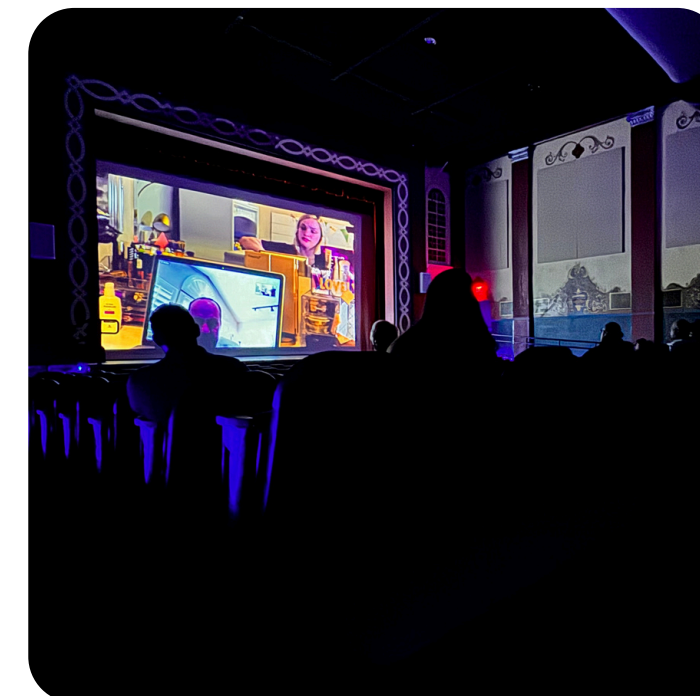

## **Legislative & Sustainable Funding - Short Term & Long Term Goals**

- **Education & Training about the legislative process for LC3**
  - **Collaborate & Retain Lobbyist**
    - **Hire a lobbyist to represent and advocate mental health in DAC**
  - **LC3: Give a presentation to legislators**
  - **Partner with NMSU Public Health, social work, and government departments to develop position and policy papers to publish, present and share with state and local leaders**
- **Build / Legislate tangible and ethical pathways to mandate care**
  - **Infrastructure for sustainability for providers**
  - **develop and build long-term BH/SUD facilities = Transitional Living Environments**
  - **Use Opioid Settlement Funding (BHSD / HCA)**

- **Goal is to expand trauma responsive, culturally and linguistically informed crisis services throughout DAC in order to provide timely, effective and accessible support to individuals experiencing mental health crises. Ultimately reducing the burden on emergency services and improving overall community health & well-being for everyone involved in the crisis process.**
- **Funding, transportation**
- **provider availability**
- **crisis services to all (youth, elderly, adults, SUD & MH/BH, all cultures, etc.).**



**After voting, Teams will be finalized, & Meetings (Recurring) will be scheduled and set by coordinators / LC3 representatives.**

Shara Thorpe is the Opioid Settlement Coordinator with the Health and Human Services Division. She, as well as HHS staff, will be conducting focus groups for the Opioid Settlement Project, in order to identify gaps, barriers, in treatment and recovery services, and develop pathways for prevention, with the ultimate goal of establishing priorities for the use of opioid settlement funds.
