Welcome

Chrystal Davis convened the meeting at 9:05 a.m. and called for brief introductions.

HHSC Jail In-Reach Programming

Anna Basler-White provided an overview of new developments implementing Jail In-Reach programming in the El Paso County Jail System. She shared that their teams are working with resources for individuals that have been found incompetent to help them get out of jail as soon as possible. These include education opportunities and policy and practice reviews as per the HHSC model. A flyer explaining the model is included with these notes.

Jail Based Competency Restoration

Christopher Hendricks and Chrystal Davis shared new information on efforts to improve options for competency restoration. The pilot project will serve 10-12 individuals and is working out of the D Unit at the Jail Annex. There is now a trained team including a Program Manager, Therapist Case worker, and a court navigator. There are currently 86 individuals waiting for competency restoration in the Jail Annex.

Mental Health Law Plan and The Judicial Commission on Mental Health (JCMH)

Judge Ana Perez and Daniela Chisholm provided reflections on the July 24th meeting and shared that a first draft of the Mental Health Law Plan with recommended next steps is in the works and expected from the JCMH soon. It was noted how important representation from El Paso's justice leaders will be at the upcoming <u>JCMH annual Mental Health Summit</u> to be held on November 20-22 Mental health Summit.

<u>Justice Leadership Coordinating Committee</u>

Michael Cuccaro and Joel Bishop commented on the efforts of the JLCC to improve county justice and diversion systems. They explained that the Specialty Courts Committee held a training last week entitled All Rise with Dr. Ocaranza as a keynote speaker presenting national trends and the local public health perspective on Mental Health and Substance Use Conditions. Mr. Cuccaro responded to questions on Jail Population increases because Operation Lonestar They also noted the following:

- it is the 20th Anniversary of Judge Anchondo's DWI Court.
- Mr. Bishop identified that they are seeing through data that the largest disparity in jail are the individuals who have been flagged Mental Health (MH) in their record. Data show that instead of streamlining and assisting individuals by adding this MH flag, it was identified that inmates sit in jail 4 times longer than those that do not get flagged leading to other negative effects by keeping people in jail longer.
- Mr. Bishop offered a more in-depth review of the data at the next JLC meeting. He will
 work with PdN Center staff to bring in Ms. Jesse Tyler a consultant who is assisting with
 data collection and analysis.
- Mr. Bishop also announced that thanks to a new partnership with Emergence Health Network (EHN), El Paso County will have a new Sobering Center. EHN will utilize \$2 million in ARPA funding and explore possible ongoing Opioid Settlement funding to develop a model center at their 1600 Montana location.

Jail Diversion Committee

Ms. Edy Payan provided an update on the activity at the last Jail Diversion Committee Meeting. It was noted that Meeting notes are circulated along with important information being shared with local community organization leaders. This meeting is held on the first Wednesday of every month at 11:30 am. The meetings are currently held via Zoom. The most recent Jail Diversion Meeting Minutes are included with these notes.

The group also discussed updates from the Public Defender's Office, jail diversion tracking, and possible related refinements in data gathering and use. In addition, the topic of training appointed attorneys to handle mental health cases was mentioned as vital for the successful

diversion of individuals in need of care as opposed to inappropriately entering the justice system.

Crisis System

Rhonda Russ provided an overview of coordinated efforts with Mobile Crisis Outreach Teams (MCOT) and the area crisis support systems.

Reentry Work Group

Catherine Jones and Elizabeth Williams reported that the reentry work group has been redeveloping and building stronger connections among community organizations working with individuals leaving the justice system. The group discussed several improvements including recent presentations offered through the work group. This group targets meetings on the last Friday of each month. Ms. Jones responded to questions from the group.

Policy Research Associates Transitional Age SIM Opportunity

Enrique Mata provided an update that Dr. Violette Cloud and her Team were not able to include a visit to El Paso under their current funding. The group, however, did provide a series of virtual workshops for partners to learn about recent developments with Transition Age Youth (TAY). They recommend El Paso submit as soon as the new fiscal year technical support grant opportunities develop to request at SIM with special focus on TAY to gather community stakeholders working with individuals in the transition age from youth to adulthood. 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 24 years of age for a day and a half SIM session possibly in March 2025.

Other Business

Isidro Torres updated the group on NAMI El Paso's NAMI Walk coming up on Saturday, October 19th. He called for those present to share this information with their friends and family.

Mr. Torres added that the 40th Anniversary NAMI Texas Annual Conference is Coming to El Paso! - on November 7-9, 2024. Every year, NAMI Texas hosts an Annual Conference and Awards Celebration. These events bring together individuals living with mental illness, family members, professionals, and the general public to highlight the latest updates in the mental health field, exchange information, and celebrate the year's successes. HHSC's Jail In-Reach Learning Collaborative

The Jail In-Reach Learning Collaborative (JIRLC) supports county forensic teams in identifying strategies to actively monitor people in county jails who have been found incompetent to stand trial and are awaiting admission into a State Hospital.

Who?

County forensic teams representing key stakeholders from local mental health authorities and local behavioral health authorities, county sheriffs' offices, jail administration, jail medical/psychiatric providers, prosecution, defense counsel, and the judiciary.

What?

• JIRLC participants will work directly with the Health and Human Services Commission's Chief of Forensic Medicine, the Office of Forensic Coordination, Forensic and Jail Diversion Services, and Legal Services Division to receive:



Clinical Consultations

- · Difficult clinical cases
- Medication management
- Guidance on competency restoration
- Guidance on courtordered medications



Forensic Services

- Free competency screenings and re-evaluations
- Expedited admission considerations
- Maximum Security Unit waiver re-reviews
- Alternate disposition considerations

Planning Support

Why?

The competency to stand trial process is designed to protect the rights of persons who do not understand the charges against them and are unable to assist in their own defense. Through the JIRLC, HHSC works collaboratively with partners across the continuum of care to improve outcomes for people waiting in county jails for inpatient competency restoration services after being declared incompetent to stand trial (IST).

How?

- Four two-hour long virtual weekly training sessions.
- Seven 90-minute technical assistance calls featuring expert speakers from across Texas and the country.
- Ongoing one-on-one support to enhance collaboration and coordination with local behavioral health and justice system stakeholders.

As a team, we learned how to advance our communication which has led to more efficiencies and a much more effective system overall in dealing with defendants who are incompetent to stand trial (IST). We were able to establish better lines of communication between our stakeholders, the first point of contact at the jail, the jail medical staff, our mental health caseworkers, and our courts, as well as bridging the communication with our LMHA. As a result, our overall approach has improved in developing and making a more cohesive, streamlined approach when making decisions regarding our mental health population who are IST.



September 2014 El Paso County, TX Sequential Intercept Map


