Our Services All FREE, all the time



- ✓ Early Childhood Parenting classes, counseling, case management and basic needs for any family with children under the age of 5. (Includes parental figures and expectant parents)
- ✓ **Counseling and Life Skills** Support to families with children between 6 and under the age of 17. Counseling services to any person of any age who has been a victim of a crime.
- ✓ Youth Outreach and Housing Help for youth and young adults 11 to 24 years of age that are going through a tough time. We can help with help with food, shelter, clothing, etc.



Fatherhood program focuses on services for fathers, stepfathers, expectant fathers or any other father figure in order to reduce the risk of abuse or neglect.



Why Dads

When dads are involved their children:

- ✓ Have less emotional and behavioral problems
- ✓ Are less likely to be victims of abuse or neglect
- ✓ Have better school performance
- ✓ Have lower rates of teen pregnancy
- ✓ Are less likely to be involved in the juvenile justice system or criminal activity
- ✓ Less likely to abuse alcohol or other substances
- ✓ Less likely to commit suicide



The Father Absence Crisis in America

Research shows² when a child is raised in a father-absent home, they are affected in the following ways...



Million Children, Nearly 1 in 4, Without a Biological, Step, or Adoptive Father at Home1



- Greater Risk of Poverty
- More Likely to Have **Behavioral Problems**
- Greater Risk of Infant Mortality
- More Likely to Go to Prison
- More Likely to Commit Crime
- More Likely to Become Pregnant as a Teen
- More Likely to Face Abuse and Neglect
- More Likely to Abuse **Drugs and Alcohol**
- More Likely to Suffer Obesity
- More Likely to **Drop Out of School**

Social and Emotional Competence

Children's early experiences of being nurtured and developing a positive relationship with caring adult affects all aspects of behavior and development.

Knowledge of Parenting & Child Development

Children thrive when parents provide not only affection, but also respectful communication and listening, consistent

rules and expectations, and safe opportunities that promote independence.



Social **Connections**

Parents with a social network of emotionally supportive friends, family, and neighbors often find that it is easier to care for their children and themselves.



Protective

Factors

Families who can meet their own basic needs for food, clothing, housing, and transportation—and who know how to access essential services such as childcare. health care, and mental health services to address family-specific needs—are better able to ensure the safety and well-being of their children.

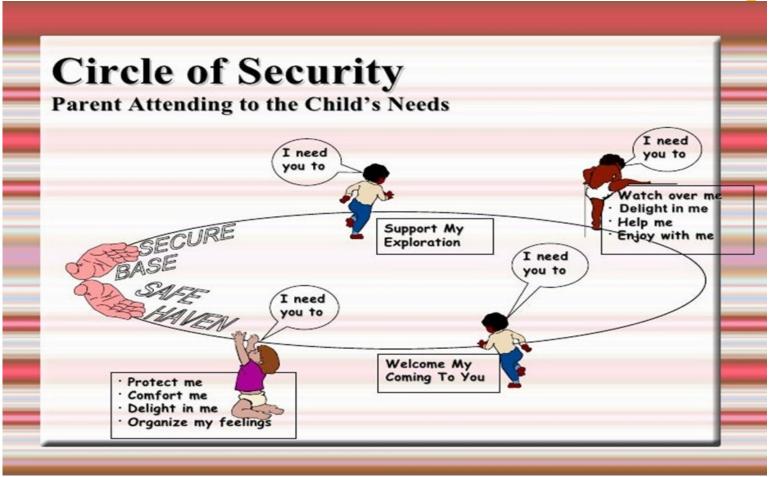




