Welcome and Introductions

Ivonne Tapia convened the meeting at 8:35 a.m. and called for introductions.

Region 19 and Hb 1481 Implementation

Wes Temple and Dr. Monica Reyes led a discussion on the recent passing of HB 1481 to ban smart phone use during the school day. The group focused the discussion on the known and potential emotional health impacts as school districts implement the changes by September 20th (as the law explains is required). The discussion included positive impacts such as preliminary data from other communities showing that student behaviors and grade improved. The group emphasized that planning and implementing ways to help the change lead to positive results was needed. This led to a call from the group and the FLC Chair, Ivonne Tapia, to initiate a Task Force. The group discussed the importance of having the youth voice included as the task force develops. Chief Medina expressed concern that a mix of youth voices are needed, not just high achievers who tend to be selected because they are seeking out volunteer opportunities. She offered her staff to work with the task force to ensure a diverse cross section of youth can provide input. Enrique Mata and Josue Lachica will work to set up the first meeting for this Task Force before the next FLC General Meeting. Related PowerPoint slides are included with these notes.

First Connection Work Group

Laura Marquez, First Connection Work Group lead, summarized the progress from the last meeting on June 17th. She and Josue Lachica emphasized the group is growing and how it needs to include more school partners. For the time being, the group agreed to on the second Tuesday of every other month (e.g. months when there is not an FLC General Meeting). The next meeting target date is August 12th at 9:00 am.

CPAN/TCHATT in 2025

Dr. Fernando Doval provided a brief presentation on the continuing growth and progress of the CPAN and TCHATT Programs. He shared that there are now sixty-five staff members under the initiative and provided data highlights on numbers of children and adults served, as well as the increasing number of child psychiatry residents and fellows practicing and eventually staying in the area as a result of this project. A data slide is included with these notes.

Specialty Care Work Group

Nicole Schiff summarized the activity from the meeting on June 24th. She then provided some de identified scenarios related to child and youth service gaps in El Paso County. One situation was particularly telling of the gaps El Paso has in serving youth under 17 years of age. Chief Medina reinforced the complexity of these situations and that they are seeing an increase in youth with trauma and in human trafficking conditions. Ms. Schiff also commented that Enrique Mata had shared a presentation on the site visit he and Josue Lachica made to Austin's Integral Care programs. The challenge for El Paso is to identify the optimal funding support necessary to maintain 24/7 care availability for individuals who need wraparound services and for those who require residential treatment. This Work Group is set up with a target monthly meeting structure for the fourth Tuesday of each month.

Other Business -

West Texas Trauma Informed Care Consortium (WTTICC)

Mariana Cardenas provided an overview of the recent meetings the WTTICC had. She commented that the Child Guidance Center is seeking input on ways to share the knowledge and importance of trauma informed training and organizational practices. Endeavors' new center

Ben Miranda, Corporate External Affairs Officer for Endeavors, shared the exciting news that their new Health and Wellness Center on the east side of El Paso. He explained that the center's services have expanded since the center groundbreaking. In addition to Veterans and their families, services are now being offered for first responders and their families. He encourages the FLC partners to learn more about the Center and hopes everyone will set aside November 11th as their grand opening is being planned for that day. 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Region 19 and Hb 1481 Implementation



HB 1481 - Signed by the Governor June 20th

- Requires the board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a charter school to adopt, implement, and ensure the district or school complies with a written policy prohibiting a student from using a personal communication device while on school property during the school day.
- The policy must establish disciplinary measures to be imposed for violation and may provide for confiscation of the device.

HB 1481 – Signed by the Governor June 20th

The policy may provide for the school district or open-enrollment charter school to comply by:

- prohibiting a student from bringing a personal communication device on school property; or
- designating a method for the storage of a student's personal communication device while the student is on school property during the school day; and
- 3) dispose of a confiscated personal communication device in any reasonable manner after having provided the student's parent 90 days' prior notice in writing of the district's or school's intent to dispose of that device.



HB 1481 – Signed by the Governor June 20th

In adopting the policy, the board of trustees or governing body must authorize the use of a personal communication device:

- necessary to implement an individualized education program, a 504 plan, or similar;
- 2) by a student with a documented need based on a directive from a qualified physician; or
- necessary to comply with a health or safety requirement imposed by law or as part of the district's or school's safety protocols.



HB 1481 – Signed by the Governor June 20th

- The bill was signed by Governor Abbott on June 20th and went into effect immediately.
- The board of trustees of each school district or the governing body of each charter school have to adopt the new policy in 90 days (September 20).
- Second Local districts must do this. It is anticipated that there will be variance at the local level about how each district implements.


